Now in its fourth year, the 'Tiny Toes' Playgroup is reaching out to a special group of people in our community, meeting a very real need for them. An initiative of The Kogarah Storehouse, it seeks to provide for parents with pre-school children an opportunity for the little ones to learn to relate to and feel comfortable playing with other children their same age.

It is also provides just as important an opportunity for the parents to relate with and get to know other parents in similar life situations. Mothers make up the main group and many of them are from migrant backgrounds with little or no other family connections or support around them. They can feel quite isolated and have little opportunity for social interaction with other mums who can be sharing the same experiences. Close bonds have developed among the group members because of their common underlying

circumstances.

The morning is well coordinated with the children being given a variety of activities and games to be involved in, which can also include the parents. Narelle, who oversees 'Tiny Toes', says she constantly sees children who at first come along and cannot leave their mum's side. However, after a couple of weeks they happily go off and play with their new found friends. Without 'Tiny Toes' they wouldn't get this exposure to meet other children outside of the home and start to develop trust and confidence which is the start to a fruitful life.

AUSTRALIAN UNEMPLOYMENT GOES OVER 5%

It is a sad fact that one in twenty Australians of working age are currently unemployed. This fact was highlighted by the May 2019 release from the Australian Bureau of Statistics. While it is true that 95% of Australians are fortunately in work, the same report suggests 8.5% of those people are not getting as much work as they would like, or need, to make their lives comfortable.

It all seems rather gloomy, and it would be, if it hadn't

all happened before. The Industrial revolution of the 18 Century saw a similar type of transformation in work and processes. The switch from agrarian to industrial production led initially to loss of jobs but then to an increase in standards of living, prosperity and population growth. The graphs of World Gross Production (GDP) and World Population are almost identical and show an exponential growth in both since the 18th Century.

Today, the changes we see in technology, and consequently the nature of work and employment, might not be all gloom but simply a reshape to the nature of how and where we work. But individuals need to be adaptable, and ready to upskill and move if possible, to where the work is. A big ask for some with limited means and this fact alone brings many to The Storehouse seeking assistance whilst they re-establish themselves in an ever-changing world.
